The canvass of the study is the whole rather than the part because what is true for the part is not necessarily true for the whole. The paper entitled "Macroeconomics" is designed to make an undergraduate student aware of the basic theoretical framework underlying the field of macro economics.

Paper - IX: History of Economic Thought (I)Paper -XIV: History of Economic Thought (II)

PREAMBLE: This course is essential for a student who aspires for advanced training in economics. Contemporary economic science has evolved over many centuries. The evolution of economic ideas in each instance was as much a response to immediate economic problems and policy issues as much as it was a self—conscious attempt to refine earlier analysis by correcting mistakes and filling in the gaps in analysis. Economic ideas did not evolve in isolation, but were an integral and important part of the evolution of modern social thought. Prevailing ideas of science, scientific rigor and measurement played a significant role in shaping of economic science at each stage of its evolution. This course, tracing the history of
